



## **Funeral Blues**

Auden wrote two different versions of this poem: the original version in five stanzas, which was a parody of a poem of mourning for a political leader written for the verse play The Ascent of F6 (1936, written with Christopher Isherwood), and the 1938 version in four stanzas that became famous when it was recited in the film Four Weddings and a Funeral (1994).

Wystan Hugh Auden Another Time (1940)

Stop all the clocks, cut off the telephone,
Prevent the dog from barking<sup>1</sup> with a juicy bone<sup>2</sup>,
Silence the pianos and with muffled drum<sup>3</sup>
Bring out the coffin<sup>4</sup>, let the mourners come<sup>5</sup>.

Rhyme scheme:

- Scribbling<sup>7</sup> on the sky the message He Is Dead.

  Put crêpe bows<sup>8</sup> round the white necks of the public doves<sup>9</sup>,

  Let the traffic policemen wear black cotton gloves.
  - He was my North, my South, my East and West,
- My working week and my Sunday rest,
   My noon, my midnight, my talk, my song;
   I thought that love would last forever: I was wrong.

The stars are not wanted now; put out every one<sup>10</sup>, Pack up<sup>11</sup> the moon and dismantle the sun, Pour away<sup>12</sup> the ocean and sweep up<sup>13</sup> the wood;

For nothing now can ever come to any good.
